# Application and Reasoning Step 1: Recognising a Sentence

### National Curriculum Objectives:

English Year 1: (1G3) Sequencing sentences to form short narratives

#### **Differentiation:**

Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain if a complete sentence has been used. Using sentences that end with full stops. Sentences include CVC, CVCC or CCVC words including single consonant, vowel sounds or digraphs.

Expected Explain if a complete sentence has been used. Using sentences that end with full stops or question marks. Sentences include phonetically decodable words, including all phonic sounds, conjunctions 'and', 'but' and 'or'.

Greater Depth Explain if a complete sentence has been used. Using sentences that end with full stops, question marks or exclamation marks. Sentences include the conjunctions 'and', 'but' and 'or'.

#### Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Identify if the sentence is correct and rewrite the sentence correctly. Using sentences that end with full stops. Sentences include CVC, CVCC or CCVC words including single consonant, vowel sounds or digraphs.

Expected Identify if the sentence is correct and rewrite the sentences correctly. Using sentences that end with full stops or question marks. Sentences include phonetically decodable words, including all phonic sounds, conjunctions 'and', 'but' and 'or'.

Greater Depth Identify if the sentences are correct and rewrite them correctly. Using some words that can not be easily decoded and conjunctions 'and', 'but' and 'or'.

#### Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain which 'sentence' is correct. Using sentences that end with full stops. Sentences include CVC, CVCC or CCVC words including single consonant, vowel sounds or digraphs.

Expected Explain which 'sentence' is correct. Using sentences that end with full stops or question marks. Using phonetically decodable words, including all phonic sounds.

Greater Depth Explain which 'sentence' is correct. Using sentences that end with full stops, question marks or exclamation marks. Using some words that can not be easily decoded.



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

### <u>Application and Reasoning</u> <u>Recognising a Sentence</u>

#### **Developing**

1a. Riya's sentence is not complete because she has missed the word 'is'.

2a. Various answers, for example: I sat on a ship.

3a. Tilly's sentence is correct because there are no words missing and the words are in an order that makes sense.

#### **Expected**

4a. Shelly has not used a verb or a noun so the sentence is not complete. It could say: My pumps are blue and white.

5a. Various answers, for example: Can I go to the park?

6a. Carla's sentence is correct because there are no words missing and the words are in an order that makes sense.

#### **Greater Depth**

7a. Martin has not used a verb so the sentence is not complete. It could say: Do I need scissors to unwrap this gift or will I be able to manage without?

8a. Various answers, for example: I did my homework yesterday but now I have to do even more!

9a. Both sentences are incorrect. Nick has not included a '?' and Charles has not completed the second part of his sentence.

# Application and Reasoning Recognising a Sentence

#### **Developing**

1b. Tom's sentence is not complete because he has missed the word 'is'.

2b. Various answers, for example: I play in the snow.

3b. Ryan's sentence is correct because there are no words missing and the words are in an order that makes sense.

#### **Expected**

4b. Matt has not used a verb or a noun so the sentence is not complete. It could say: My ball is black and white.

5b. Various answers, for example: I ran to the shop.

6b. Will's sentence is correct because there are not words missing and the words are in an order that makes sense.

#### **Greater Depth**

7b. Fiona has not used a verb so the sentence is not complete. It could say: I like my hat with the flower on it but I would prefer it if it was blue.

**8b.** Various answers for example: Why did it rain on Saturday but not when I was at school?

9b. Both sentences are correct. Andy has not completed the second part of his sentence and Cheryl has put the words 'some' and 'collected' the wrong way round.
