

Developing

- 1. "My favourite part of our school trip was when I waved at the baby penguin!"
- 2. 'Gift shop' does not need any additional inverted commas. Stara has used a question mark instead of a comma. The sentence should read: "My parents bought me this interesting book from the gift shop in the museum," said Isabelle happily.
- 3. Freya is correct because the opening inverted commas and closing inverted commas have been used in the incorrect places in this sentence.

Expected

- 4. "Hi there!"; "Would you like one of my chewy sweets?"
- 5. Hamish has not included the first inverted commas and he has incorrectly placed the final pair of inverted commas before the exclamation mark. The sentence should read: "Chris, can we go to the park after school today?" asked Billy. "I really want to show you my new football skills that I learnt at the weekend!" shouted Billy excitedly.
- 6. Savannah is correct because the sentence needs another pair of inverted commas to show where the first part of the speech stops. The sentence should read: "Have you got any wrapping paper at home?" Brenda asked, "That I could use?"

Greater Depth

- 7. "Why do we always have to watch a horror film when it's your turn to use the remote? You know they make me have nightmares!"; "Remember, they're not real and just close your eyes if you feel scared at any point."
- 8. Jonny has forgotten to use closing inverted commas after the first exclamation mark. He has also forgotten to use closing inverted commas in the final sentence. A comma should not have been used in the middle of a reporting clause. The sentences should read: "Have you noticed that Mr Johnson always wears the same pink shirt on Thursdays?" asked Jemima. "Maybe it's his favourite day of the week!"
- "I hadn't noticed but I think he has an awesome tie collection though!" joked Finley.
- **9**. Darren is correct because a comma is used after a reporting clause when the reporting clause comes before the direct speech.
