

My brother couldn't work out how to switch the television on! "Please don't do that," asked the teacher kindly.

- 5. Louise is incorrect. In the sentence she has written, 'he's' is the contracted form of 'he has'. The apostrophe is actually used to replace 'h' and 'a' and not 'i'.
- 6. Sentence A is incorrect because the apostrophe should be placed between 'n' and 't' The expanded words are 'was not' and in the contraction, the apostrophe replaces 'o' and is written as 'wasn't'.

Sentence B is incorrect because the apostrophe should be placed before the 'r'. The expanded words are 'we are' and in the contraction, the apostrophe replaces 'a' and is written as 'we're'.

Sentence C is incorrect because hes and shes are contracted words but don't have any apostrophes in. Hes should be written as 'he's' and shes should be written as 'she's'.
