Differentiation:

Questions 1, 4 and 7 (Application)

Developing Join 2 sentence parts together to make 1 full sentence, including the relative pronouns who or which. Relative clauses are at the end of sentences.

Expected Join 2 sentence parts together to make 2 full sentences, choosing the most appropriate relative pronoun. Relative clauses are at the end of sentences.

Greater Depth Join all the sentence parts together to make 2 full sentences, choosing the most appropriate relative pronoun. Relative clauses are embedded.

Questions 2, 5 and 8 (Application)

Developing Complete the sentence using a relative pronoun. Using who or which with the relative clause at the end of the sentence.

Expected Complete the sentence using a relative pronoun. Using who, which, that, where or when with an embedded relative clause.

Greater Depth Complete the sentence using a relative pronoun. Using whoever, whomever, whichever, whenever or whatever.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Reasoning)

Developing Explain if the relative pronoun has been underlined. Using the relative pronouns who and 'which with relative clauses at the end of sentences.

Expected Explain if the relative pronoun has been underlined. Using the relative pronouns whose or where.

Greater Depth Explain if the relative pronoun has been underlined. Using a variety of sentence types with multiple pronouns, and the relative pronouns whenever and whichever.

Application and Reasoning Relative Pronouns

Developing

Expected

- 4a. Alice remembers the day when she won the race. My brother is the one who is wearing the red shirt.
- 5a. Various answers, for example: Christmas time, when my family come to visit, is my favourite time of year.
- 6a. Yes, the relative pronoun is 'whose' at it refers to the girl.

Greater Depth

- 7a. The girl, who is ten years old, went to the park. The walk that we went on was very long.
- 8a. Various answers, for example: We'll give the prize to one of the children, whomever has drawn the best picture.
- 9a. No, the relative pronoun is 'whenever' as it refers to the best time to call in.

Application and Reasoning Relative Pronouns

Developing

- 1b. I learned a lot from my mum who used to be a teacher.
- 2b. Various answers, for example: I waved cheerfully at the postman, who was carrying a huge parcel.
- 3b. No, the relative pronoun is 'who' as it refers to the boy's father.

Expected

- 4b. This is the boy whose father is in the army. Annie liked the new bed which was very comfortable.
- 5b. Various answers, for example: The cardboard box that is in the attic is full of decorations.
- 6b. No, the relative pronoun is 'where' as it refers to the supermarket.

Greater Depth

- 7b. Samuel, whose father was a postman, helped him deliver the post. Alesha left at midnight, when the show had finished.
- 8b. Various answers, for example: Bring me some chocolate or crisps, whichever you can find in the cupboard.
- 9b. No, the relative pronoun is 'whichever' as it refers to the blue and red objects.
